

Tribal-led Sustainable Resource Systems Project;

Apply for funding for planning and implementing tribal projects with ATNI. Example projects include climate adaptation planning, emergency preparedness & response, clam gardens, forest cultural burning, alternative energy development, and more.



The USGS released a <u>notice</u> announcing the opportunity for the public to comment on the draft prospectus for the <u>Biodiversity</u> <u>and Climate Change Assessment</u> and provide nominations for membership on the assessment authoring team. Deadline: July 7.



FUNDING OPPORTUNITIES

2023 America the Beautiful Challenge; National Fish and Wildlife Foundation will award \$116 million in funding, with 10% set aside for Tribes, and will invest in the restoration of watersheds, forests and grasslands while including strengthened resilience, equitable access to the outdoors, workforce development, migration corridors, habitat connectivity and collaborative conservation. **Full Proposal Deadline: July 20.**

<u>Tribal Engagement in Regional Ocean Partnership Priorities</u>; NOAA announced the availability of \$1.8 million for federally-recognized Tribes to support tribal participation in or engagement with existing regional ocean partnerships. **Deadline: August 30**.

Preventing Outages and Enhancing the Resilience of the Electric Grid; the Department

of Energy will provide grants to Indian Tribes to improve the resilience of their electric grids. Funding allocations vary. A <u>recent amendment</u> increased Year 1 and Year 2 funding for certain Tribes, as well as extended the application deadline; New Deadline: August 31.

Harrison is from Gallup, New Mexico. Their area of expertise is within curriculum designing, Indigenous education, Indigenous frameworks, Gender & Sexuality, and Indigenous political theory.

Currently, they are an Intern with CAVU (Climate Advocates Voces Unidas) and a Fellow with ATNI. Their work is about bringing an Indigenous perspective to the important issue of climate change. They are working on designing a curriculum for community use and doing community outreach to tribal communities. Harrison's works to ensure a sounder understanding of sovereignty, land relations, and opportunities for community action/healing on climate change.
