FUNDING OPPORTUNITIES

[BIA Tribal Climate Resilience Program Fiscal Year 2023 Annual Awards Program](#);

Tribes and tribal organizations can apply for a total of \$120 million in funding to address the effects of climate change on tribal communities through both planning and implementation projects. Award categories and requirements are found [here](#). **Deadline: October 13.**

[NDN Community Action Fund](#); Awards up to \$30,000 as available. Supports efforts that include community organizing, amplification of community voices, and utilize a wide variety of tactics imperative to shifting the political and financial systems that are impacting communities. Areas of emphasis may include climate justice and accelerating the just energy transition in Indigenous communities. **Deadline: October 31.**

[Restoring Tribal Priority Fish Passage through Barrier Removal Grants](#); Awards range from \$300,000 to \$12 million. With NOAA, awardees will use the funds to build tribal organizational capacity and implement projects that reopen migratory pathways and restore access to healthy habitat for tribally-important species. **Deadline: November 8.**

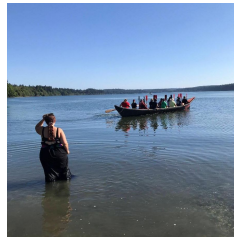
