FUNDING OPPORTUNITIES

Tribal Access to Emerging Private Markets for Climate Mitigation or Forest

Resilience; USDA Forest Service announced a competitive grant opportunity authorized under the Inflation Reduction Act and is available to Tribal Nations, Tribal organizations and other Tribal entities specifically. The Forest Service is providing at least \$20M in competitive funds to support Tribal Nation participation in emerging private markets for climate mitigation or forest resilience. Examples of emerging markets and related proposed projects may include markets for water quality and quantity, carbon, biodiversity, and wetland restoration. Deadline: August 21.

FY25 NIDIS Coping with Drought Competition: Understanding and Assessing

<u>Drought in a Changing Climate</u>; Between \$50K and \$250K per year over 2 years is available. This competition seeks projects focused on improving drought indicator performance to account for non-stationarity with the goal of more accurate drought assessments that support communities in preparing for, mitigating, and responding to drought. <u>An informational webinar</u> will be held August 22 at 10am Pacific. Letter of Intent Due: September 18.

BIA Tribal Climate Resilience Annual Awards Program; BIA has announced over \$120M will be made available across three funding categories: Category 1 - Planning (\$250K max, competitive); Category 2 - Implementation (\$4M max, competitive); and Category 3 - Relocation, Managed Retreat, Protect-in-Place (\$150K per year over 3 years, non-competitive) Staff. TCR awards may also be used to meet other Federal and non-Federal cost share/match requirements required by statute. Access the RFP here. Deadline: October 18.

Bipartisan Infrastructure Law (BIL), Tribal Engagement in Regional Ocean


Partnership (ROP) Priorities; NOAA announced a funding opportunity support tribal activities aligned with ROP (i.e. West Coast Ocean Alliance) priorities, including identification of ocean and coastal priorities. Up to \$400K over 2 years is available. Deadline: October 31.

<u>Inflation Reduction Act Community Change Grants Program</u>; EPA is accepting applications on a rolling basis for \$2 billion in Inflation Reduction Act funding available to support community-driven projects that build capacity for communities to tackle environmental and climate justice challenges, strengthen their climate resilience, and advance clean energy. Awards vary depending on application track. Technical assistance available. **Deadline: November 21.**

The Northwest Climate Resilience Collaborative's Tribal Coastal Resilience Portfolio, co-led by ATNI and the University of Washington Climate Impacts Group, recently released the report: Climate Adaptation Barriers and Needs Experienced by Northwest Coastal Tribes. This report is based on listening sessions held in 2022-2023 with Oregon and Washington Tribal staff, citizens and elected officials, as well as a review of earlier relevant assessments and publicly available Tribal documents. In an effort to increase Tribal Nation priorities and perspectives on these important climate issues, the report web page also includes an addendum containing Tribal government comments on the report. The U.S. Committee on the Marine Transportation System (CMTS) published a request for information (RFI) in the Federal Register to identify what planning guidance, data sources, and grants U.S. ports have used in planning for long-term environmental change, and to identify if there are any barriers to action in planning for the future. Submit comments by: August 29.



The White House Council on Native American Affairs created a Critical Minerals Working Group and invites Tribes to consult on the September 2023 Recommendations to Improve Mining on Public Lands report. Through this consultation, the Administration seeks to prioritize and implement recommendations from the report that will benefit Tribes.
